

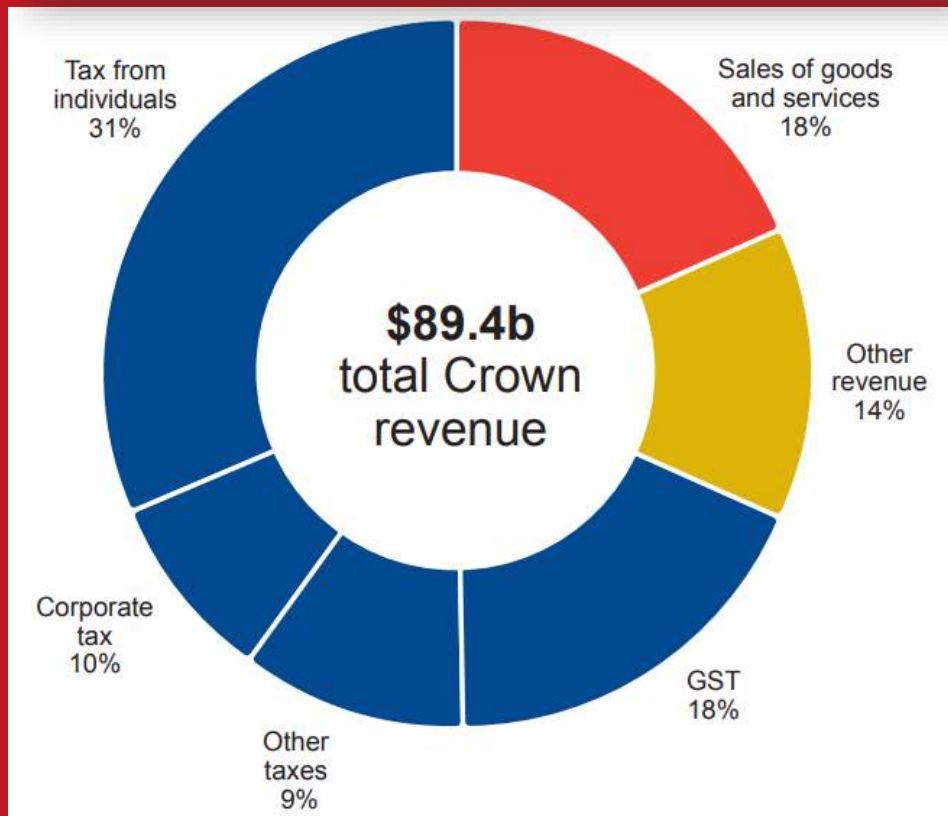



Christchurch City Council is hiking rates by 52 per cent over the next 10 years.

Older people living on the breadline in Christchurch could face a choice between putting food on the table or paying household bills in the coming decade, a charity boss believes.

The grim prediction comes after the city council approved a 50 per cent increase in rates over the next 10 years as part of a \$10.6 billion "back to basics" plan.

- 10. reduces the cost of government**

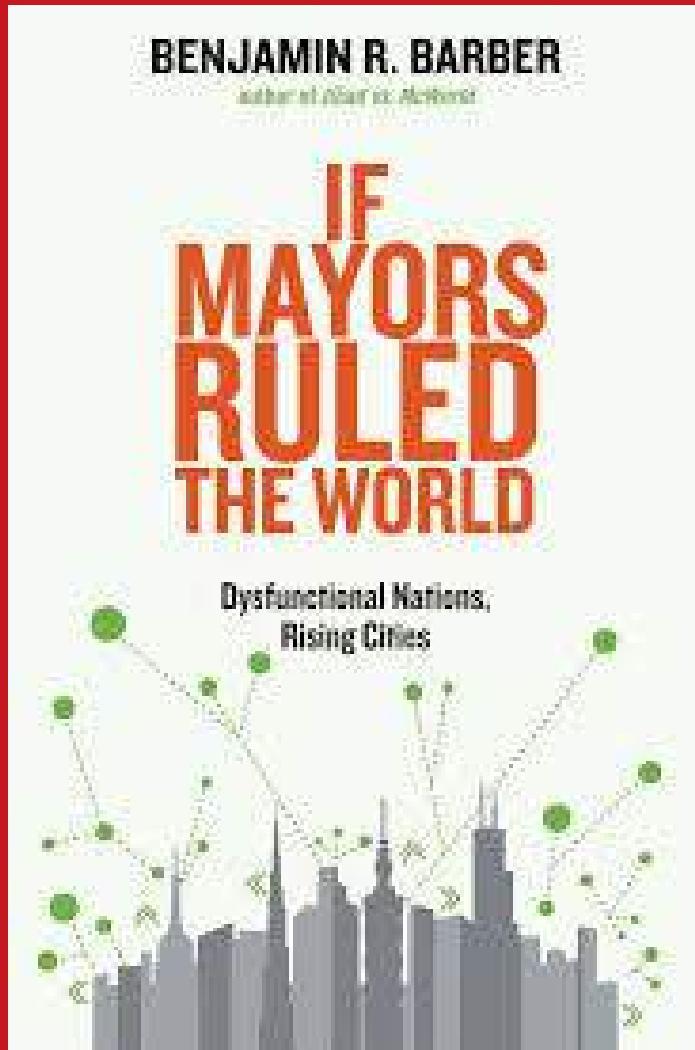
